

Copyright Policy: internet access on the Grapevine network

Copyright laws protect many materials, including music, film, TV and computer programs. Generally they are protected for a period of 70 years following the author's death. Users cannot download, store or disseminate these materials without the permission of the copyright owner (unless a legal exception applies).

You should not assume that material is "copyright free" simply because it is available and can be downloaded from a website or using file sharing protocols such as BitTorrent or newsgroups. In many cases, material is publicly available without the permission of the copyright owner.

If you upload, store, download, transfer or otherwise deal with copyright material without permission of the rightsholder or applicable exception, even for personal use, you may be liable for infringement.

Grapevine customers are reminded that, under their End User Agreement and Acceptable Use Policy, the use of Grapevine services to infringe copyright material is not permitted.

If it is alleged that you have infringed the copyright of material using Grapevine's service, or we otherwise become aware that you have done so, we may take any or all of the following actions at our discretion:

- notify you that we have received an allegation of infringement from a rightsholder;
- ask you to voluntarily remove or disable access to the material subject of the alleged infringement;
- disable or remove your access to the allegedly infringing material;
- inform the copyright owner (or their authorised representative) of the action taken by Grapevine;
- suspend or terminate your Grapevine account with or without further notice to you.
